One very large change happening in California is the signing of a new law called SB946. This law requires California health plans to offer coverage of what the law defines as “behavioral health treatments” for members with autism spectrum disorders. These requirements take effect on July 1, 2012.

Those of us working in outpatient hospital settings are bracing ourselves for a flood of children diagnosed with autism to come in for their medical speech-language evaluation to qualify for these services. ASPS, Inc. contracts with a large outpatient healthcare company in California, and they’ve already requested two new full-time SLP’s from our agency just for their Orange County location. We will probably receive more requests soon.

For those of you with keen observational skills, you may have noticed another change at the top of our newsletter. That’s right, we have a new logo! Over the past few years we have been expanding our staffing support beyond speech-language pathologists. Autism Resources

None of us have time to read every Advance Magazine article or ASHA Leader. In the latest online ASHA Leader live, there were some useful links to resources to use for the assessment and treatment of autism. Some of us graduated from school so long ago, that autism was not the hot topic that it is today. For those people, there are good videos of some lectures from Prof. Fred Volkmar of Yale that you can download for free from iTunes.

These are class lectures, so they are about 45 – 90 minutes long. At autismteachingstrategies.com/our-how-to-videos-2/ there are many short videos about how to teach social skills to children with autism. One video explains how to use The Conversation Train kit that is available for purchase from autismteachingstrategies.com.

Another website you may find useful is cccoe.net/social/skillslist.htm. This website provides forms that focus on social skills for children in middle school. Subjects include accepting criticism, accepting “no”, apologizing, and asking a favor. Each form provides dialogue to teach the children to learn and practice in a role-play situation. There is also an evaluation checklist. There are hundreds of situations on just this one website page. Many of them seemed appropriate to use with verbal 4th & 5th grade students with autism or Asperger’s as well. Hopefully you will find these tips useful in your treatment!
